#### Review of the Year

#### Introduction

Although our 2020/2021 season was all but wiped out by the Covid Pandemic, I am very glad to say that our 2021/2022 season was almost normal, despite the face masks! Again, it is to the credit of committee, thanks largely to the excellent work of our Honorary Treasurer and some very welcome further donations and grants that we have remained in good financial health.

### Review of the Season

During the full season we have experimented with our new venue partner, Bromsgrove School. The facilities open to us have been two excellent auditoria, Routh Hall and the Cobham Theatre, including live-streaming for which a reduced ticket price was charged. We underpinned our commitment to our artists by making huge efforts to re-engage those whose concerts had to be cancelled or postponed in 2020/2021. Thanks to the prolonged liaison and negotiation work by Alan Cook, these efforts were wholly successful. They were much appreciated by our returning audiences and by the artists themselves at this difficult time for the music industry.

We are still enjoying the new book, authored by our Secretary, Joyce Chamberlain. This was launched at the start of our 2021/2022 Season and received good reviews, particularly from Christopher Morley, Birmingham's long-serving music critic and arts editor. Chris also offered a complimentary review of Craig Ogden's brilliant guitar recital in Routh Hall.

This was the highlight of our season. Artistically we were pleased that our performers not only gave works from the standard repertoire but also offered some sadly neglected pieces, among them those by Rebecca Clarke and Erno Dohnyani. We were delighted to give a live performance of Robert Simpson's String Quartet No 1, having previously streamed a filmed performance on 2 March 2021 for the composer's centenary anniversary.

We continued our policy of widening our offerings by putting on concerts by a brass quintet of young players studying at Birmingham Conservatoire and by a chamber ensemble of about 15 players from Birmingham Philharmonic Orchestra, who played wind serenades.

We benefitted from very welcome grants from the Elmley Foundation for our innovative season and from the RVW Trust for our programming of works by contemporary British composers.

We have a new committee member to confirm at our AGM, Janine Parsons. She is an experienced musician who has already made a contribution to our work as a co-opted member.

We now know that we can offer our concerts both in person and virtually over the internet. The committee has been at pains to review the way the new regime of concert delivery has progressed with our concert goers. These lessons will be carried forward to our next season.

I am therefore very optimistic that we have a great future ahead and I hope that music lovers of all ages will continue to discover what we do and join us on an exciting journey into next season.

# Treasurer's review of the year

This report is not a chronological review. Considering the situation last summer, I believe the team managed the season well.

# Administration

Online banking has been helpful. The recently introduced (November 2021) current account charges for processing cheques (£0.40 each) and for current account admin (£5 per month) was not welcome. Bromsgrove Concerts has 3 accounts with HSBC, 2 current accounts and a deposit account. The second current account receives the money from card transactions from the BC website card provider and the SumUp terminal. There are many reasons to separate commercial transactions from the main business account.

The information from the Bromsgrove School box office (telephone and online sales of full priced tickets and tickets for access to the streaming link) worked well. I was able to make a finance/budget report within a week of each concert. Invoices for the hire of halls and other costs were charged net of receipts from the box office. The club is still not able to capture contact email addresses for audience members who walk in on the night.

For last September, we codged up a system for the sale of subscriptions.

I wish to send my thanks to staff at Bromsgrove School and to colleagues on the committee for their help and support. We started with a blank sheet of paper and managed to make things work, if a little clunkily. I believe that we know where improvements need to be made for next season.

Financial performance

We will show a loss of £3,700.

The support for the 22 October concert by the Tippett Quartet from a club member was taken into the accounts last year but the benefit accrued to this year with a reduced performance fee. One of the members made a substantial donation and 20 out of 35 members gave donations of more than £20. Constraints meant that the committee was only able to make two major applications for grants – to Elmley Foundation and to the RVW Trust. The £3,000 received was very welcome. However, in previous years grant income of £4,000 to £4,500 was achievable.

The target for ticket sales was £10,000. We achieved less than £8,000. There are many suggestions as to why this happened: ineffective marketing efforts, the hiatus since the last concert at Artrix in 28 February 2020, a change in the venue, restrictions during the pandemic and fear among many of our members who considered themselves to be vulnerable.

The sales of the programme book, the second-hand CD stall and the "History of Bromsgrove Concerts since 1963" did not come up to expectations and was the cause of £500 of the remaining shortfall.

Help for musicians

The club has made good all the commitments made to artists before the pandemic. The club starts planning for 2022/2023 with a clean slate.

## Members

The committee is enormously grateful to members who made donations. We have tried hard to keep in touch with supporters by email. The offer of our live streamed concerts is helping those who find it difficult to venture out on dark nights. We sent messages of encouragement and newletters where we have permission for electronic marketing. We have sent messages of condolence to relatives of members who died.

# **Reserves Policy**

The policy of the Trustees is to maintain reserves so far as possible at a level that approximately equates to next year's expenditure. The Trustees deem this to be necessary in view of uncertainty over the level of financial support from outside bodies. This means we need to be able to underwrite committed expenditure for booked artists and venue for the following season before we start to receive ticket income. The committee will adopt a responsible and ethical approach to the investment of any funds not required to support the day-to-day operations of the club, including funds needed to underwrite future liabilities. We await new guidance from the Charity Commission.

# Risk Management

The Trustees actively review the major risks that the Charity faces on an annual basis. The receipt of a substantial legacy in 2020 will enable the charity to ride out this year's deficit while it rebuilds its audience in the new venue and whatever COVID-19 brings next autumn. However, there continues to be a need to review the controls over key financial systems. The recruitment of Trustees and officers to take up the work of running the club remains the biggest risk to the sustainability of the club. The Trustees have also examined other operational and business risks faced by the Charity. They confirm that they have established systems to mitigate the significant risks.

# Statement of Trustees' Responsibilities

The Trustees are required under the Charities Act 1993 to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the Charity's financial activities during the year and of its financial position at the end of the year. In preparing financial statements giving a true and fair view, the trustees should follow best practice and:

- a) select suitable accounting policies and apply them consistently
- b) make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent
- state whether applicable accounting standards and statements of recommended practice have been followed, subject to any departures and explained in the financial statements
- d) prepare the financial statements on a going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the Charity will continue in operation.

For the year ended 30 April 2022, the Trustees are responsible for keeping accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy the financial position of the Charity and which enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with applicable law and regulations. They are responsible for safeguarding the assets of the Charity and for taking reasonable steps for the prevention of fraud and other irregularities.

The printing costs for 125 copies of Bromsgrove Concerts – a history since 1963 is shown here. The copies have been delivered and the asset has been conservatively valued at invoice value less grants and donations receive. (£485). Sales (25) yielded £315 during the season. Some (20) were donated to contributors and libraries. 80 books are currently in stock and sales will begin again in September 2022. The income statement includes postage recovered as part of sales and all the card fees for online sales of books and fees for streaming access.

The grant from Festive Classics (£250) was repaid along with a contribution from unrestricted funds to cover the hire of a piano for one of its concerts in July 2021. PRS charges are paid via Making Music with a cut off of 31 October 2021. The fee at 2021 rates is £153 and will be taken in December 2022 with a change in rate and concert in the new season up to 31 October 2022. Bank charges are paid one month in arrears and valued at £10.

# 7. RESTRICTED FUNDS (Cont'd .....)

By unanimous decision of the trustees present at its meeting on 10 May 2022 a sum of £3,500 was transferred from restricted funds to unrestricted funds (from the Ernie Kay legacy) as part of the two-year project to rebuild the audience and the club's long-term viability following the closure of Artrix.

The trustees were also minded to maintain the "Grants held in provision" as restricted funds only for 2022-2023 season and will transfer to unrestricted unless used for some educational outreach activity during the 2022-2023 season.
